Green Auditing

Green Auditing of the campus is conducted by the department. A pre-audit awareness survey was conducted in the campus by randomly selecting 50 students. After the survey a Campus Green Corps was formed by including the interested students who volunteered for the conduct of green audit. Solid waste, water, carbon emission, plastic and food waste generation were assessed along with energy consumption. The number of automobiles entering in and going out of the campus was recorded to analyze the carbon emission. Solid waste was segregated for analysis. For this waste bins were placed in different areas of the campus. Biodiversity was also monitored during the audit period.



1.0 INTRODUCTION

2.4. Other Courses and Facilities

The College offers ten UG Programmes in job oriented subjects such B.sc (polymer chemistry, Zoology , Physics, Psychology) , BA English , B.com finance ,B.com Computer Application , Bvoc Optometry & Ophthalmological Techniques ,Bvoc Retail Management and BCA and 5 PG Programmes such as M Com , MSc Polymer Chemistry , MSc Physics ,MSc Zoology and MA English.

An off campus study centre of University of Calicut under the School of Distance Education is functioning in the college. There are over 1000 students attending degree courses at the centre. Most of them are working class people used to undergo their graduation through this study centre. The classes for them are arranged only on Saturdays and Sundays. The classes begin at 10 AM and ends at 4.30 PM. For a degree student, he/she should attend 4 sessions per paper. Each sessions has a duration of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours. All the students who undergo graduation through this study centre are treated exactly that of a regular student admitted in a college except in the duration of the classes.

2.5 Library

The primary mission of our Library is to collect, organize, and disseminate information to serve students, faculty and other staff on roll of the college to meet their educational, professional and recreational needs. Being the central hub of the teaching learning process of the College, the library caters to the educational needs of the academic community.

Library started functioning in the year 1981 with modest facility. It began with a few books & periodicals for the pre- degree students and staff. With the introduction of various UG and PG courses, the library has also grown in tandem over all expansion .The library started getting UGC assistance only in 2005. The library shifted to a spacious new building in 2007. The new building is functional and modular in construction. It has an area of 1059.69 sqm. In two floors – Ground floor and upper ground floor. It has a collection of about fifteen thousand books and subscribes to 59 periodicals and 13 newspapers. The Library follows the "Anglo American Cataloguing Rule" for cataloguing and "Dewey Decimal Scheme of Classification" for the classification of books. The central library is fully automated.

The ground floor houses Newspaper reading section, Circulation section, reprographic (Photocopying section), Technical section, General reading Area, Periodical section, catalogue section, Stack area ,book bank section, new arrival displaying section, Librarians cabin, property counter ,and toilet etc. E-library, Internet browsing centre, Reference section, Audio visual Theatre, Career guidance corner, and Bound periodicals section. The Library offers online public access catalogue-(OPAC) a computerized catalogue service. Most of the books in the library are bar coded. This helps the circulation counter in issue and return of books quickly. Members are given bar - coded ID cards and books are issued on producing the I D cards. Book magic is the software used in the library for its automated activities. Loan period of Books can be renewed by sending a request to the Librarian, specifying the membership number and accession numbers of the documents to be renewed. Book lending service is provided to all the members of the library.

A degree student is entitled to get three books and PG student six at a time. Teaching staff are entitled to get ten books and non-teaching staff five books. A book is issued for a period of fourteen days and it can be renewed for further two terms.

3.2.2 External Audit Team

The External Team is headed by the CEO of the Organization (Muscat Projects & Environmental Services Pvt. Ltd.) Er. M. Dileep Kumar, Former Senior Environmental Engineer of Kerala State Pollution Control Board and former Director of Suchitwa Mission, Local Self Government Department, Govt. of Kerala, who has about 34 years of service in the area of implementation of environmental legislations, preparation of project reports for solid waste management, Septage management, slaughter houses etc. Er. M. Dileep Kumar has also been involved in providing technical support for establishing Sewage Treatment Plant and standalone Septage Treatment Plant at Brahmapuram through the KSUDP, viz Kerala Sustainable Urban Development Project. He also had experience in preparing and evaluating various projects for solid and liquid waste management as part of official engagement in Kerala State Pollution Control Board, KLGSDP, State Planning Board and various local bodies.

The Study Team is having other Team Members comprising of Sri. Renjith R.S. Project Engineer who is Graduate in Chemical Engineering, Sri. Anoop G.R. Project Associate, a Graduate in Civil Engineering, Sri. Arun Sagar.P Project Engineer who is Graduate in Civil Engineering and Sri. Jinin D.C Project Associate, a Graduate in Civil Engineering and they are the staff members of Muscat Projects & Environmental Services Pvt Ltd. The above mentioned team had associated with the task of conducting of Environmental Auditing. The team had also having experience in preparing similar Environmental Audit Report for Government Sanskrit College, Thiruvananthapuram and MES College, Marampally, Ernakulam.

3.3 Objective of Auditing

The process of Green Auditing/ Environmental Auditing has begun initially in United States of America (n USA). Green Auditing were not started in USA by local authorities, but were the commercial establishment to show their response to national requirements. Auditing were the result of legislation which made the companies responsible for environmental damage they were causing. In 1970's the U.S Government adopted the "Polluter Pays" principle and in order to avoid liability, the Company is resorted to broad performance reviews and compliance audits. This helped the companies to evaluate how they were performing with regards to control of pollution. Gradually the concept of Environment al Auditing has been extended so that the governmental and local institution in its purview.

A typical Environmental Audit involves the analysis of inputs and outputs and looks into the environmental impact of raw materials used and the product that are produced. The Environmental auditing should be open, objective and honest and freely available to the community and environmental group so as to raise environmental issues in the community.

3.4. Objectives of the Green Auditing

This Green Audit is conducted in an educational institution therefore the main aim of this auditing is to evaluate the system and facilities available in the college for creating a community with sense of environmental protection for sustainable living and to equip them to hand over the environment in better manner to the next generation.

Therefore the main objective of the Green Auditing are;

- To evaluate preliminary status of water, air and natural environment protection activities within the campus.
- To assess level of energy conservation activities in the Campus.
- To assess the status of solid and liquid waste management activities in the campus.

- To assess the social activities undertaken by the students related to environmental protection.
- To identify the gaps in the above mentioned areas for initiating actions from the College level and for rectifying it.
- To make College Campus a more environmentally sustainable and ecofriendly institution in future.
- To create a sense of eco-friendly living among the students in order to guide them to live in an eco-friendly manner

4.0. ECO FRIENDLY ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN IN THE CAMPUS

4.1. Rain Water Harvesting Activities

The College campus is situated in a land of low altitude terrain thereby availability of water especially during summer season is a real challenge if there is no proper ground water recharging. There is real challenge to meet the water requirements of day scholars and hostlers .The College has adopted multiple approach for harvesting the rain water and to recharge the ground water to meet the water demand of the College. As part this activities the college has initiated an approach for converting the available land in different levels for facilitating harvesting rain water and storage of local ground water.

The approach adopted in the campus for rain water harvesting activities are the site specific multi prong type suitable for the whole area, including the surroundings. The activity undertaken within the Campus is the natural way of rain water harvesting activities undertaken by forming a series Terrance Bunds. Under this activity, the whole land has been divided into different rain water harvesting zones by making terrace bunds. Due to terrace bund, flow of rain water over the land can be retarded and allowing the rain water to penetrate in to sub surface part of the soil for recharging the ground water. During heavy rain a part of over flow water from the land is being diverted to the nearby storm water drain for conveying it the nearby low lying area / old paddy fields . Due to this activities the College has succeeded in keeping the ground water table at higher levels during summer season. Thereby there is no need of bringing drinking water from outside sources using tanker Lorries

Another effort taken by the College Management is the establishment of Water KIOSK at different places in the campus for meeting drinking water needs of the students. The College has established 3 Water KIOSK at different places within the Campus for making drinking water available to the students and staff.

In addition to the above the College had also initiated action for providing extended service to the society through its Nature Club and NSS Units in Rain Water Harvesting activities in the surrounding areas. As part of this activity, they have involved in providing support for their Rain Water Harvesting activities in nearby Schools situated around the College. The aim of this activity is to create the culture of social service among students and to create awareness for natural way of rain water protection activities

4.2 Solid Waste Management Activities in the Campus

There are two student's hostel and a canteen functioning in the Campus. The college management has given importance for proper management of Solid and liquid waste generated in the campus. In the case of solid waste, especially easily biodegradable waste (Food Waste), there is a system of storage of waste at the source of generation. Waste from different places are being collected and utilizing the Biogas Plant established in the campus for treatment and disposal of easily degradable waste. Remaining part of not easily Biodegradable type of solid waste is also being collected from different part of the College Campus and Buildings and transported in to a a Compost Pit made in the Campus for vegetable cultivation/ gardening in the Campus. The College is also promoting zero use of fertilizer and pesticide and trying to create awareness among students for using bio fertilizers instead of chemical fertilizers and pesticides.

Plastics and other non-biodegradable waste are also collected from the entire campus area and stored in plastic bags for handing over the same to recyclers. Now the Campus is declared as a Plastic Free Campus by banning use of plastic carry bag within the Campus. There is one canteen functioning within the campus and Solid Waste from that canteen is disposed of utilizing a Floating Dome type Biogas Plant installed in the back side of the Canteen Building. They are utilizing the Biogas generated from the plant in the Kitchen for cooking/ Hot water generation. Remaining waste is being composted in the Traditional Compost Pit made in the Campus. Photo of Biogas plant is given below.




Fig 10: Biogas Plant in Campus.

There is separate hostel facilities in the Campus for Boys and Girls and situated at the both ends of the boundary. In Girls Hostel for treatment and disposal of food waste, there is a fixed dome type Biogas Plant operating in the compound of the Hostel. Biogas generated from that Biogas plant is utilizing in the Hostel for cooking / hot water making in the Kitchen. The Hostel is also having girl friendly toilets with Napkin Destroyer. Sanitary pads from the Girls Hostel is treated and disposed through the Napkin Destroyer. The Chimney of the Napkin Destroyer is having sufficient height therefore there is no chance of creating Air Pollution problems inside the Hostel building/ campus.

4.3 Liquid Waste Management Activities in the Campus

Liquid waste are mainly generated from Toilets and bathrooms in the Hostels, College Buildings and canteen. There is a proper system for segregated collection of Black Water from Toilets of Hostels and College Buildings and Grey water generated from Bath Rooms and Kitchens of Hostels and canteen. Black water from toilets of Boys Hostel and Girls Hostel is being collected, treated and disposed of utilizing proper Septic Tank and Soak Pit system constructed in the Campus. Black water from toilets of all College Buildings are also collected, treated and disposed of utilizing onsite Septic Tank and Soak Pit system constructed in the Campus. There are 2 major Septic Tanks and Soak Pits units are functioning in the Compound for this purpose. As per the Indian Standards (BIS code IS 2470 0f 1981), septic tank and Soak Pit system is permissible for Hostels and institutions having a unit size less than 300 students. Here there are 10 Septic tank Soak pit Systems are provided in the Campus for treatment and disposal of Black water in a de-centralized manner. Hence the facilities provided in the Campus for treatment and disposal of black water is sufficient and statutorily admissible method of disposal.




Fig11: Photo of Strom Water Percolation Drain

In the case of Grey water there is separate Soak pits near to all sources of generation of Grey water for treatment and disposal in a natural way. The above mentioned activities are aiming for conserving natural resources and for recovering resource from waste. The ultimate aim this activities are aiming for giving a message to the students on the necessity of conserving the natural resources and to utilize the waste materials for recycle, reuse to the maximum extent and eco-friendly living culture. The activity is benefiting the campus to keep the Campus clean and tidy and to keep it in a hygienic manner

4.4 Energy Management

Electricity to campus is supplied by the Kerala State Electricity Board Limited. (KSEBL) .The College is encouraging students to minimize the use of electricity and encouraging for use of natural light and ventilation to the extent possible in the Class Rooms. The College management has also initiated action for utilizing Renewable Energy for minimizing use of electricity supplied by KSEBL. As part of this initiative, action has been taken for tapping of Solar Energy a form of renewable energy from the available open space/ roof tops. The College has imitated action for establishing a Solar Power Generation Unit within the Campus. They are in the process of preparing proposals for that for submission to the appropriate authorities for getting subsidies / funds including the College Management/ corporate office. They are planning to operate the Library fully with Solar Power.

The College Campus is made student friendly by making Benches/ sitting places within the Campus. Action has been taken by the college authorities to provide seating facility under the trees for encouraging students to spend time near to the trees during their leisure hours. The existing trees and plants are maintained neatly. The Campus is maintained with trees plants and grass. There is a good number Trees of traditional type as well as garden plants within the campus. Local trees like Coconut, Jackfruit and Mango trees are planted within the campus for giving shade and greenery environment in the Campus.

The College in association with Kerala Biodiversity Board has developed a Bamboo Corner by planting Bamboo trees in the bank of the paddy filed. This area is having well grown up Bamboo trees for providing a resting place for the students. There is an herbal garden within the campus.

4.6 Transportation

Majority of students and staff are utilizing College buses and public transport system for minimizing the usage of own four wheeler and two wheelers for their travel. There is one College buses, operating in an efficient manner for covering almost all areas around the College for collecting students. Remaining are utilizing public transport system for their travel needs. This indicates that they are achieving the target of using lesser carbon footprint of student in the transportation sector.

4.7 Open space in the Campus

The College Campus is having **13** Acres (**52546 sqm**) of land situated in a Rural setting at Marampally near to Aluva in Ernakulam District, Kerala. The College Buildings are well designed so that all building spaces are getting sufficient air and natural light. The main block of college Building is a well-designed building and its Architectural beauty is notable and it is maintained neatly. The College Buildings are having a total built up area is **48,600 sq. ft**. It is about **10.81 %** of total land area. This indicates that minimum built up area and thereby succeeded in maintaining maximum open area within the Campus. Details of Built up area available in the Campus is given in Table 9.






Figure 15: Invertebrate faunal diversity




Fig17: Distribution of vertebrate faunal diversity at the college campus




Fig18: Comparative analysis of vertebrates and Invertebrates

Summary of the work done:

We have conducted this survey for a period of one month during February 2019 to March 2019.Here a total of 90 different species of organisms

5.2 Study Findings

The study reveals Flora and Fauna Biodiversity in the Campus categorized under invertebrates and vertebrates were observed and recorded. Invertebrates as usual were the most dominant ones representing 63 species compared to the rest of 27sp in vertebrates. We have used different collection procedures like sweeping net, pitfall method and simple hand picking methods for carrying out this survey. We have taken photographs for most of the species for easy taxonomic identification and cross checking analysis. Insect fauna and avian fauna deserves much attention to the survey as they are the most dominant ones.

Invertebrate fauna were represented by the following insect orders Lepidoptera, Odonata, Orthoptera, Hemiptera, Phasmatoidea, Diptera, Coleoptera, Hymenopter a and phylum Annelida, Phylum Mollusca and Phylum Arthropoda while Vertebrates by Amphibia, Reptilia, Aves and Mammals. The survey reports shows that this campus is seems to be best homage for a wide variety of species and hence long term sustainability is very much needed. The field study gives the opportunity to observe and understand the behavior of every organisms in relation with their natural habitat. The morphology, anatomy, behavior, habitat preference, food preference etc. could easily helped us to understand their ecological importance for executing their life sustainability. As biodiversity analysis is that much important for conserving species which is prone to be the verge of extinction, these kinds of survey analysis are obviously needed. When we are exposed to the nature's bosom during field work and interact with various existing biotic and abiotic factors in diverse habitats, we gather the maximum knowledge in a pleasurable situation.

6. ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS AND OTHER ACTIVITIES IN THE CAMPUS

6.1 Plantation Awareness Program

The College had organized various Tree Plantation program at College Campus and surrounding villages through NSS unit of the College. The plantation program includes plantation of various types of ornamental and medicinal plants species in large numbers in each surrounding areas. This program helped in maintaining an eco-friendly environment as well as provides pure oxygen within the Campus.

6.2 Environment Awareness Program

The College had organized various awareness programmes through the club activities in the following are the board areas of activities.

6.4.3 National Service Scheme (NSS)

There are three National Service Scheme units in the college. Through them students involve themselves in co-curricular activities, intellectual discussion, and community service. An NSS volunteer will be eligible to receive a certificate for the participation in NSS provided if he/she completes 240 hrs of regular NSS work and attends a special camp with minimum of 7 days duration.

Report of The Survey on The Flood Impact on The Biodiversity of Irmbiliyam Panchayath

The Kerala State Biodiversity Board was conducting a "Rapid assessment of Biodiversity of Flood affected Areas of Kerala" as per the instruction of the Kerala Government in association with KILA. As part of it the department of Zoology was entrusted an assessment survey on the Impact of Biodiversity on Irimbiliyam Panchayath one of the worst affected Panchayath in the Malappuram district. Two faculties Krishna Prabha.K S and Thushara U attended a 2 day state level training workshop at Karmasadan, Alappuzha. The participants were trained to use the ODK software that is used in the survey.

Following the state level workshop, a district level workshop was conducted on 15th October along with the members of the Local Self Governing Body and BMC of the Panchayath at Malappuram. In the planning meeting it was decided to conduct **Focus Group Discussion** at the Panchayath on 17/10/2018. The ward members of the affected regions, Agriculture Officer, Veterinary doctor, ASHA workers of affected wards, BMC members, 5 student volunteers will be invited to the FGD.

5 student volunteers were selected from the department who will lead the field survey in the Panchayath.

On 17th October 2018, a **Focus Group Discussion** was conducted at the Irimbiliyam panchayath office. Ward members of the affected regions, Agriculture Officer, Veterinary doctor, ASHA workers of affected wards, BMC members and 5 student volunteers participated. In the first session the need, process and methodology of the survey was explained to the audience. In the second session the FGD was conducted and the details

collected were uploaded in the KSBB link using ODK software. From the work shop conducted and the Focus Group Discussion following, it was found that out of the total 17 wards, 15 wards were affected by the flood. But 2 wards were very meagerly affected. So the field survey was decided to be conducted on 13 wards and the schedule was prepared from 18th to 27th October.

Field survey was conducted by our students in the 13 affected wards under the leadership of the 2 faculties and 5 trained volunteers. 1st semester UG and PG students participated in the survey. Daily reports (ward wise) were given to Mr. Vinesh, Project fellow KSBB and also mailed to the district co-coordinator Mr. Hydrose kutty sir. After completing the survey, a consolidated survey report was submitted to the board.

7.0 CONCLUSIONS/ RECOMMENDATIONS

MES Keveeyam College is an aided education institution having the credit of sustaining lot of traditional values, at the same time there are lot of shortcomings and inadequacies. The College has succeeded a lot in achieving certain results/targets in the area of giving environmental awareness among the students and to equip them for practicing eco-friendly living.

The following are the main achievements / activities undertaken in this context.

- Rain water harvesting activities such as terrace bunds and storm water drains with open jointed stone pitching for enhancing percolation of Rain water to the local ground water.
- Support for Local Ground Water recharge and environmental Protection activities in the nearby areas as part of awareness programmes.
- Establishment of Solid Waste Treatment Facilities like Biogas plants, Compost pits and establishment of Napkin Destroyers in hostel.
- Providing drinking water KIOSK at different places within the Campus.
- Development of Bamboo Park within the Campus.
- Beatification/ greening activities in the Campus

At the same time, lot to be done for improving it further. The following are the major identified shortcomings in the area of eco-friendly activities in the Campus.

- Lack of proper Solid Waste Treatment Facility for not- easily Biodegradable Waste like tree leaves, plantain leaf, banana stem etc.
- Lack of involvement for regular cleaning of surrounding areas of Herbal garden/ side of storm water drain.

The following are few suggested future activities for further betterment/ improvement.

• Conducting of Environmental Auditing in the College Campus in every two years.

- Provide Rain Water collection facilities from roof top of buildings directing to the open wells.
- Establishment and operation of a scientific source level treatment of not-easily Biodegradable Waste like Banana leaves, leaves of trees and plants etc. for composting and utilization of the same for gardening/ vegetable cultivation in the Campus with involvement of students. Aerobic Ferro- Cement Tank Composting Unit shall be established at two places near to the boundary at the side of Herbal Park.
- All lighting needs including public lighting facilities should be converted in to LED lamps connected with solar electricity generation units.
- Making garden in the front of all building for making the campus beautiful and ecofriendly.
- Adoption of Green Building concept for all future new building construction within the campus. More focus should be given for reducing energy usage for lighting and air and for increasing aesthetic appeal of buildings and class rooms in order to reduce the Carbon foot print.
- Installation Fire safety instruments in all buildings.
- Annual cleaning of campus for clearing waste / bush, in order to avoid pollution problems.
